The new version is 6.1b dated 22 September 2004.

If this is NOT the version you are currently running, please download and install it. The version number is shown at the top of the operating window.

An installation file called "InstallNZART04v6.1b.exe" will be downloaded. Run this file. It should install the later version on top of the older one. Run the new program just as before, you should not notice any difference.

NZART Council Meeting: - NZART Council met at the Porirua Police College this weekend. Many items were discussed and a summary of discussions are:

Association Treasurer Evan Sayer submitted the un-audited financial accounts for 2004. These show that NZART is in a healthy state and special thanks to all members for their continued support of their Association.

All Officers annual reports presented were tabled and will be published in the next issue of Break In.

Election voting for President and Council closes on 20 the March, with a count being completed at headquarters on the 21st March. All candidates will be notified of the results the same day by phone. Members will be advised, via the Official Broadcast on 27th March, HQ Info-line 3rd April and also the March April issue of Break In due in your letterboxes on or about the 4th April.

A representative from the Ministry of Economic Development, Wayne Wedderspoon, attended the Council meeting, together with Fred Johnson ZL2AMJ to further discuss licensing changes on General User Radio Licenses (GURL). Negotiations are ongoing at this time, with more details being made available to all members in the very near future.

The National Director and AREC Section Leaders also held their face to face meeting at the Police College this weekend. NZART Executive felt it was a great opportunity to keep up with AREC events, training and future plans. Further meetings where AREC meets at the same time as NZART Council will be encouraged.

LICENCES PROPOSED FOR CANCELLATION - A recent review of Amateur Radio Licences has identified the following inactive licences. In the absence of any objections, it is proposed that the MED be requested to cancel these licences. Please contact FMTAG before the 27th of April, if there is an objection to cancellation of any of the licences, giving the reasons for the objection. We would also like to know of any other licences that should be cancelled.

INTERIM RECOMMENDATIONS TO COUNCIL

Branch 60 Taupo has applied for a 2 metre Short Term Special Purpose (STSP) FM voice repeater, to be stored at the clubrooms, grid reference U18 790759. We have selected 6875, being a repeater transmit frequency of 146.875 MHz and a repeater receive frequency of 146.275 MHz, as being the most appropriate.

Branch 74 Wellington VHF has applied to increase the output power of the Belmont ATV repeater transmitter on 615.25 MHz (Channel 39) to 500 Watts PEP, the maximum permitted under the new licence conditions, which came into effect on the 17th of June 2004. All its other characteristics remain unaltered.

Branch 28 Whangarei has applied for a 2 metre data repeater, to be located at Parahaki, grid reference Q07 318089. We have selected 5425, being a repeater transmit frequency of 145.425 MHz and a repeater receive frequency of 144.825 MHz, as being the most appropriate.

The Canterbury Amateur Radio Development Society (CARDS) has applied to move the 6 metre FM voice repeater from Eyrewell, to Cass Peak, grid reference NZ260 M36 797300. The repeater transmit frequency is 53.850 MHz and the repeater receive frequency is 52.850 MHz.

Local Government Issues with Mike Newman ZL1BNB:

NZART has opposed the Proposed Waikato District Plan in a submission forwarded to the Council.

Following a meeting of representatives of the Hamilton, Huntly and Raglan branches the submission was prepared jointly by Hamilton Branch Secretary Phil King ZL1PK and Mike Newman ZL1BNB, our Local Government Liaison Officer. The submission opposes severe restrictions on antenna heights and numbers.

The process requires the Council to advertise the submissions received, and call for further submissions, and then to prepare reports on the plan and all submissions before conducting public hearings. At the public hearings, in-depth evidence supporting the submission will be presented to the Council.

It could be a year or more before amateurs in Waikato District, including Ngaruawahia, Huntly, Raglan and the Hamilton peri-urban area know whether their submissions have been successful in convincing the Council its plan should be less draconian than the present proposal.

From The Editor Of Break-In John Walker ZL3IB:

Many BI contributors are now sending their copy and/or graphics/photos on CDROMs. This is convenient and much appreciated but I now have quite an accumulation of used disks. Nowadays CDROMs are quite inexpensive if bought in bulk as reels, and I wonder if they are worth the cost (\$1+) of returning? I am more than happy to return them to authors but please advise at time of sending if you wish them to be returned; otherwise they will be dumped after BI is published. I find a low-cost, but adequate, method of sending is to enclose the disk in a paper or plastic sleeve, sandwich this between 2 sheets of light card (ie, omit the plastic case) and send in an A5/C5 size envelope. This method is especially economical if posting overseas where thickness of the envelope is a limiting factor.

Following a meeting of representatives of the Hamilton, Huntly and Raglan branches the submission was prepared jointly by Hamilton Branch Secretary Phil King ZL1PK and Mike Newman ZL1BNB, our Local Government Liaison Officer. The submission opposes severe restrictions on antenna heights and numbers.

For permitted uses the proposed plan

- 1 limits antenna heights to:
 - 7.5 metres in the Living Zone (ie, residential)10.5 metres in the Country Living (rural settlement)13 metres in the Rural Zone
- 2 limits the maximum number of antennas on a property to three, while at the same time including supporting poles within that number.
- 3 is vague as to whether an antennas and/or its supports are considered as structures.
- 4 limits dishes in the living zones to 2 metres diameter.

5 has height control planes which if applied to a 7.5 metre height would require a property width exceeding 17 metres , for a 10.5 meter height 27 metres while for a 15 metre height the width needed would exceed 45 metres.

The thrust of the submission is that the amateur service and amateur operators are severely limited, both in communication and experimentation, by the plan proposals which should be relaxed to allow, as permitted uses;

antenna support structures up to 15 metres in height, dishes up to 4 metres diameter, height control planes not to apply to antennas and their supporting structures, no limit on number of antennas and supporting structures, antennas and their supporting structures be exempted from the definition of a structure.

In a submission signed by President Peter Nordern ZL2SJ, NZART wrote that

"Amateur Radio (commonly known as "Ham Radio") is a recreational and self-training activity and a communication service that is established and governed by international statute. It fosters cutting-edge experimentation in radio-technology and related topics, and provides a pool of scientific research worldwide. As a result of this wide spread radio expertise, Amateur Radio is in the forefront of emergency communications facilities, both internationally and locally. Amateur radio requires appropriate antennas; it can only function with antennas of adequate sizes and heights. Amateur Radio operators, by international regulatory definition are without pecuniary interest, so have limited resources to meet unduly restrictive requirements for planning processes.

I oppose the proposed plan since it fails to accommodate as permitted uses the reasonable requirements of amateur radio operators and the amateur radio service, through excessive limitations on the height, location and numbers of radio antennas (aerials) and their supporting structures. I wish to have the plan amended to remove the unduly severe restrictions of the proposed plan on the amateur service, so as to allow as permitted uses antennas erected at proper height and dimensions and in sufficient number for communications effectiveness and experimentation and otherwise to reasonably accommodate amateur radio service communications."
